AP Capstone: Seminar Syllabus

Course Description: (Adapted from the College Board AP Capstone: Seminar Course Description)

AP Seminar is a foundational course that engages students in cross-curricular conversations that explore the complexities of academic and real-world topics and issues by analyzing divergent perspectives. Using an inquiry framework, students practice reading and analyzing articles, research studies, and foundational literary and philosophical texts; listening to and viewing speeches, broadcasts, and personal accounts; and experiencing artistic works and performances. Students learn to synthesize information from multiple sources, develop their own perspectives in research- based written essays, and design and deliver oral and visual presentations, both individually and as part of a team. Ultimately, the course aims to equip students with the power to analyze and evaluate information with accuracy and precision in order to craft and communicate evidence-based arguments.

Due to the interdisciplinary and inquiry-based nature of this course, students will develop skills that support the AP Quest Framework of questioning and exploring, understanding and analyzing, and synthesizing various resources, in addition to collaborative team skills that transmit information and transform. Seminar students will engage in college-level discourse as they use these skills to explore in depth themes.

The course will be broken down into 4 Units plus a short review prior to the AP Test in May.

Course Expectations:

Participation & Preparation: Students are expected to actively participate in discussions, peer critiques, group work, and other activities and/or assessments. Students are expected to complete homework and/or readings for effective class discussion and use for developing the skills needed in this course and successful completion of AP exam requirements.

Grading Policies: While a significant amount of time is spent on the development of portfolio requirements for the AP score, students will still have intermittent assignments and grades. Grades will be calculated each nine weeks in accordance with district grading standards and as follows:

50% Major grades - minimum 2 assessments (EOC practice, practice IRRs, TMPs, IWAs, IMPs) **50% Minor grades - minimum 7 assessments** (Discussions, research checkpoints, peer reviews, etc.)

Missing/Late work:

Missing work due to absences will be accepted in accordance with the BISD Secondary Grading Guidelines.

All work is due at the **beginning** of class. In accordance with the BISD Secondary Grading Guidelines, graded work will be accepted up to 2 class periods late. Work turned in 1 period late will <u>start</u> at a 70. Work turned in 2 periods late start at a 50. Work submitted after these deadlines will not be accepted and will receive a 0.

<u>Retakes:</u> In accordance with the BISD Secondary Grading Guidelines:

- *Students may retake any written quiz below a 70 each nine weeks grading period.
- *Students may retake a **maximum** of 1 written test below a 70 per nine weeks grading period.
- The recorded grade will be the higher of the two grades, with a maximum grade of 70.
- Exceptions to this policy are semester and final exams, where no retake is allowed.

Plagiarism:

AP Seminar students will be instructed in ethical research practices and academic honesty and integrity in accordance with BISD Guidelines, as well as the AP Capstone Policy regarding plagiarism. Additional information regarding College Board's policy on AI will be discussed in more detail in class.

AP CapstoneTM Policy on Plagiarism and Falsification or Fabrication of Information

A student who fails to acknowledge the source or author of any and all information or evidence taken from the work of someone else through citation, attribution or reference in the body of the work, or through a bibliographic entry, will receive a score of 0 on that particular component of the AP Seminar and/or AP Research Performance Task. In AP Seminar, a team of students that fails to properly acknowledge sources or authors on the Team Multimedia Presentation will receive a group score of 0 for that component of the Team Project and Presentation.

A student who incorporates falsified or fabricated information (e.g. evidence, data, sources, and/or authors) will receive a score of 0 on that particular component of the AP Seminar and/or AP Research Performance Task. In AP Seminar, a team of students that incorporates falsified or fabricated information in the Team Multimedia Presentation will receive a group score of 0 for that component of the Team Project and Presentation.
